A record-breaking bowl gets turned at The American Woodworker Show™

t happened last fall, when the AMERICAN WOODWORKER Show,™ came to the Novi Expo Center (in Novi, MI) and the Fort Washington Expo Center (in Fort Washington, PA). Thousands of showgoers were greeted with an amazing sight—the world's largest bowl being turned by renowned British turner Stuart Mortimer.

During the three days of each show,
Mortimer and a team of assistants—
including AW contributing editor Steve Blenkenthralled the crowds as they hollowed and shaped
the 8-ft.-dia., two-ton chunk of Sitka spruce. The
blank spun slowly (about 25 rpm) on a
Tyme/Multico lathe brought over from England.
Another gigantic turning adventure is planned
when The AMERICAN WOODWORKER Show™
comes to the Ontario Convention Center, outside Los Angeles, from March 6 through 8. ▲

THE BIRTH OF A BOWL



1 Bucking a chunk. David J. Borek of Maple Specialties in Washington slices off a 5,600-lb., 8-ft.-dia. bowl blank from the butt end of a spruce log. The tree that yielded this behemoth blank was 285 ft. tall.



2 Cutting away the waste. Mortimer removes excess wood from the inside and outside of the blank with a chainsaw, reducing the weight to around two tons. A center stem is left for attaching to the lathe's tailstock.


BIGGEST BOWL



3 Finding center. Mortimer and AW contributing editor Steve Blenk find the center for attaching the faceplate by pivoting a weighted string around the outside of the blank.

4 Mounting on the lathe. Chains, heavy strapping, and a forklift hoist the big blank onto the headstock. A unique pivoting chuck on the tailstock allows for slight imbalances

as the blank spins.



5 First inside cut.

Using an 8-ft.-long, custommade gouge with a replaceable cutting tip, Mortimer makes the first inside cuts.
